


Where in the world do the sculptures come from?

What shapes do your dreams take? Add your dreams to the top of this sculpture.




BUILD A DREAM

How does this person feel?




CARAMBOLA

This work was created by an Italian sculptor, but cast in bronze in Thailand. The artist applied a patina on the outside of the sculpture to make it green. The sculpture's color will continue to slowly change over the years as it reacts to the air and weather.

Carambola's figure is upside down, balanced on a sphere. Do you think the figure is falling? Do you think the figure is balancing? How does this person feel? If you turn upside down, how do you feel?

How does your school help you as you learn and grow?




ELEMENTS

What do you like to build?




HAMMER TRIBUTE

What can your hands say without words?




HANDSHAKE

These hands are shown in a handshake, something that makes a connection between people. How can your hands make a connection? What can your hands say without words?


What do you think needs protection?



IL SEGRETO by Emanuele De Reggi

This sculpture was created by Emanuele De Reggi, an Italian sculptor, and Il Segreto means "the secret" in Italian. What is the secret? Why does it look like a fish? 
Make the surface of the sculpture shine like a star.


What could you make out of scrap?



LENAPE GATE by Harry Gordon

New Jersey sculptor Harry Gordon likes to use scrap, leftover stone, to create his sculptures, instead of quarrying new stone out of the ground. He used a crane to get the granite pieces of this sculpture in place, and then carved details. This sculpture also has sound. If you cup your hand over the small holes at the bottom of the sculpture, and tap on the stone, you will hear it ring. What could you make out of scrap? Are there leftover materials in your home you could use in an art project? Scrap paper or cartons? An old magazine or broken toy?


Add nature in the background of this sculpture.


What do you think about when you look out over the water?



SELENE by María Gamundí



She transformed a hard, square block of marble into something that can remind us of the way a flower grows out of a crack in the sidewalk. 
SPRING BREEZE


by Rodney Carroll

How do they look different?






TIME by Lee Tribe



DETAILS: Stainless steel, 20' tall. Made in Chicago. Installed 2011.

SITE: Intersection of Jefferson Avenue

and 31st Street

Hunt was the first African-American sculptor to have a solo exhibition at the Museum of Modern Art in New York City.

CARAMBOLA

ARTIST: Emanuele De Reggi

DETAILS: Bronze, 15' tall. Cast in Thailand.

Installed 2008.

SITE: Main Street Library, 110 Main Street

De Reggi has traveled all over the world from his home base in Italy to learn and

practice sculpture.

ELEMENTS

ARTIST: Inger Sannes

DETAILS: Marble, 11.5' high. Carved at Studio Sem, Pietrasanta, Italy.

Installed 2008.

SITE: Christopher Newport University, intersection of Avenue of the Arts and

Shoe Lane

Sannes participated in an art and science project at the Oskar Klein Centre in Stockholm, Sweden, a center that brings together particle physicists, cosmologists, and astrophysicists.

HAMMER TRIBUTE

ARTIST: Jim Benedict

DETAILS: Galvanized steel on granite,

16' tall. Installed June 2017.

SITE: Corner of Canon and City Center

Boulevards

As an Associate Professor of Sculpture at Jacksonville State University in Florida, Benedict has created 9 large public art pieces with his students.

HANDSHAKE

ARTIST: Gunther Stilling

DETAILS: Cast aluminum, 10' high. Made in Pietrasanta, Italy. Installed in 2013.

SITE: Traffic circle at Thimble Shoals Boulevard and Town Center Drive, at entrance to City Center in Oyster Point

Stilling focuses his sculptures on the body, and the combination of old and new.

IL SEGRETO

ARTIST: Emanuele De Reggi

DETAILS: Bronze, 8' tall. Cast in Italy.

Installed 2004.

SITE: Walt Whitman Avenue at Mark Twain

Square, Port Warwick

De Reggi grew up in an artistic family — his grandfather Emanuele Cavalli was a

painter in Florence, Italy.

IZAR

ARTIST: Bruce White

DETAILS: Stainless steel, 30' high. Made in

Illinois. Installed in 2007.

SITE: Newport News/Williamsburg International Airport entrance, Jefferson

Avenue and Bland Boulevard

Bruce White has installed permanent sculptures in 14 different states.

LENAPE GATE

ARTIST: Harry Gordon

DETAILS: Red granite, 12' high. Made in

New Jersey. Installed 2004.

SITE: Emily Dickinson Square, Port Warwick

In addition to being an artist, Gordon is a specialist in sculpture installation and has installed most of the NNPAF's

sculpture collection.

NATURAL

ARTIST: Masaru Bando

DETAILS: Bronze with marble base, 15' high. Bronze forged at Fonderia Mariani, Pietrasanta, Italy. Installed 2003.

SITE: Intersection of Thomas Wolfe and Philip Roth Streets, Port Warwick

In addition to being exhibited in museums and galleries, Bando has installed 25 permanent sculptures throughout the world. Three of them are here in Newport News.

REINVENTED

ARTIST: Rob Lorenson

DETAILS: Stainless steel, 16' diameter. Made in Massachusetts. Installed in 2005.

SITE: Intersection of Canon and Thimble

Shoals Boulevards, Oyster Point Lorenson's work is included in over 200 public and private collections.

SELENE

ARTIST: María Gamundí

DETAILS: Marble, 7' tall. Carved at Marble Studio Stagetti, Pietrasanta, Italy. Installed 2013.

SITE: Museum Parkway at Kettle Pond, near the Lions Bridge

In addition to sculpting in marble, bronze, and terracotta, Gamundí has also made works of stained glass.

SPIRIT OF LIFE

ARTIST: Helaine Blumenfeld

DETAILS: Carrara marble, 11' high. Made at Studio Sem in Pietrasanta, Italy. The marble benches are also by Blumenfeld. Installed 2005.

SITE: Entrance to Riverside Regional Medical Center, 12000 Warwick Boulevard

In 2011, Blumenfeld was awarded an OBE, an Honourary Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II for her "remarkable contribution to the arts as one of the boldest and most diverse artists working today," a rare honor for an American and an artist.

SPRING BREEZE

ARTIST: Rodney Carroll

DETAILS: Stainless steel and bronze, 18' tall. Made in Maryland. Installed 2001.

SITE: Entrance to Port Warwick, 11800 block

of Jefferson Avenue

Carroll's 24 ft. tall *Jitterbug* can be seen in nearby Norfolk in the Broad Creek Renaissance neighborhood. It's one of his 80 public art installations, the tallest of which is 56 ft. high.

TIME

ARTIST: Lee Tribe

DETAILS: Steel, 13' high. Made in New York.

Installed in 2013.

SITE: 12750 Warwick Boulevard, across from

Peninsula Memorial Park

Tribe uses the skills he learned as a boilermaker to make his metal sculptures, and incorporates cables, chains, rods, and hardware in his work.

WHITETAIL CROSSING

ARTIST: Wendy Klemperer

DETAILS: Salvaged industrial materials. Created in New Hampshire and New York. Installed December 2015.

SITE: Entrance to Deer Park at 11523 Jefferson Avenue

Klemperer earned a degree in biochemistry from Harvard before becoming a sculptor.



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
